The Town of James Island held its regularly scheduled meeting on Thursday, October 16, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. in person at the Town Hall,1122 Dills Bluff Road, James Island, SC. This meeting was also live streamed on the Townis website at <a href="www.jamesislandsc.livestream-townmeetings">www.jamesislandsc.livestream-townmeetings</a> and was held in accordance with the S.C. Freedom of Information Act and the requirements of the Town of James Island.

<u>The following members of Council were present</u>: Dan Boles, Lewis Dodson, Cynthia Mignano, Darren î Troyï Mullinax, and Mayor Brook Lyon, who presided. <u>Also present</u>: Town Attorney Brian Quisenberry, Finance Director Mike Hemmer, Public Works and Licensing Manager Melissa Flick, Town Engineer Laura Cabiness, Island Sheriffis Patrol Captain Shawn James, Planning and Zoning Director Kristen Crane and Town Clerk Frances Simmons.

Mayor Lyon called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Notice of this meeting was published and posted in accordance with the S.C. Freedom of Information Act and the requirements of the Town of James Island. The Town encourages the public to provide comments prior to its Town Council meeting. Residents wishing to address the Council are limited to three (3) minutes and must sign in to speak. Comments may also be sent ahead by emailing to: info@jamedislandsc.us, mail, or place in the drop box at the Town Hall.

Mayor Lyon introduced herself as mayor, the members of Town Council, staff, and recognized and congratulated Shawn James, newly promoted to Captain.

<u>Opening Exercises</u>: Councilman Dodson recited a prayer that his great grandmother, a poet laurate from Mississippi, and an uncle that served on Town Council offered at meetings. The Pledge of Allegiance followed.

Presentation: Wakeup Carolina Nanci Shipman, founder and Executive Director of Wakeup Carolina thanked the Council for the opportunity to present a proposal to partner with the Town through the SC Opioid Recovery Fund (SCORF). Ms. Shipman's proposal, *î The Spero Collective*ï, is a collaborative initiative designed to strengthen overdose prevention, recovery, and wellness to individuals and families for opioid treatment. James Island is slated to receive funding for \$79,156.07 from the Opioid settlement and projects includes a *î* Barney Boxï Naloxone Stand, with 24/7 access to Narcan. The partnership also includes a community coordinator who will conduct communication and education to the public to help with opioid addiction.

Mayor Lyon stated that the deadline to apply for the funds is tomorrow (October 17). She clarified that if the Town does not apply we will lose the funds. Ms. Shipman answered questions from Council. Proposal:

Presentation: Charleston County Transportation Sales Tax: Devri DeToma, Charleston County, gave an overview of the Charleston County Transportation Sales Tax (TST) Half-Penny Tax. She said that Charleston County Council formed a committee in September to solicit feedback from municipalities and citizens for the future funding of infrastructure, greenspace, and transit as the Half-Cent Sales Tax, in existence for 20 years will expire in 2027. Municipalities and citizens are being asked to share their thoughts about how 4.25 billion should be used for future projects if the Half-Cent Sale Tax is not extended. Ms. DeToma noted the short time of 45 days for response but encouraged Council to prioritize what they would like to see, what has worked well, and what has not. No suggestion is a bad idea at this point. Some projects funded through the Half-Cent Sales Tax include 895 miles of resurfacing rural roads and local paving, there is 73% better pavement condition than the state, 49 miles of bike and pedestrian paths, and improvements to 69 intersections. Ms. DeToma answered Councilwoman Mignano's question about the tagged trees (at the round-about) on Fort Johnson and Camp. She said they are protected trees and are not being taken down. Councilman Boles asked about the concrete barrier (left on Fort Johnson) and livability concerns. Ms. DeToma asked him to send her an email, and she will follow up on these concerns.

#### **Public Comment:**

Zoe Gaillard, 1880 Ferguson Rd: Zoe recommended the proclamation on tonightis agenda to recognize her former teacher, Colonel Remington. Zoe said that she attended JI Charter HS and graduated in 2022. She joined the JROTC in her sophomore year and described herself as shy with low self-confidence. She credits her instructor; Colonel Remington who helped her find her voice and boosted her confidence. During the next three years, she became one of the most knowledgeable cadets in the unit with more than 80+ hours of community service. Colonel Remington has been like a dad to her ever since high school. He is the kind of person that looks out for others and brings laughter wherever he goes, even during tough days with his dadis jokes. She is proud to be like a daughter to him and to be a part of his family.

Oblain Perez, 35 Cross Creek Dr: Oblain is an alumnus who graduated in 2023. He was also a student of Colonel Remington. He joined the unit in his freshmen year as a shy student and as he learned more about the program and Colonel Remington, he loved it. While growing up he did not have much of a father's figure or the morals that he has now. Colonel Remington was a father figure who taught him the wisdom that he carries to this day making him who he is. One of the biggest things he was taught was *î choices have consequences*, good or bad'i. Colonel Remington helped to inspire and motivate him to enlist in the Army National Guard which he still serves. He is grateful for everything that Colonel Remington has taught him and could not have asked for a better instructor and father figure. He is happy that Colonel Remington continues to show that same kindness to all cadets who need it and benefits from it.

Colonel Scott Remingtoin, 5520 Remington Tr, Johns Island: commented that when Zoe told him that he was receiving a mayoral proclamation he was surprised and humbled. He started the job in July 2019 and if he were asked the year before if he would be teaching high school he would laugh at you. That was not something that he considered but life has a way of changing things. When he started the job he questioned his sanity but by the end of the semester he loved what he did. He was in a situation to have direct impact on young people like Zoe and Oblain whose home situation was not ideal, and he was able to impart wisdom and mentor them. It was his daily prayer to be a mentor for the kids in his program. To have them speak the way that they did tonight is humbling to be the recipient of their commentary. The program allows him to watch kids aged 14 and 15 to grow, mature, and hopefully become citizens of character and Zoe and Oblain are fine examples of. This is a great job that he will strongly recommend to retirees at the Air Base because his position ends the 2027school year and wants his replacement to have the passion that he has grown to have.

Martina Remington, 5520 Remington Tr. Johns Island: Is blessed to have been married to Scott for 40 years. He has taught her much about love in action. He did not mention that he did an entire career in law enforcement at the same time that he served as an Air Force Reservist; and that was love in action, and now he gets to instruct kids daily. She thanked Council for showing this community support to Scott.

Mayor Lyon stated that she did not have a correction but wanted to make a comment on page 3. She commented that she misspoke and did not remember from two years ago when she said that we added an additional speed hump on Seaside Lane, and it was actually two. They were initially going to get two, and two more were added. The Town Clerk has provided copies of the minutes referring to that, but she wanted to make that clarification. There were no other corrections or discussion. Minutes approved unanimously.

## Mayorìs Report:

<u>Update on Art and Community Center</u>: biweekly meetings continue with the team and Councilman Dodson has graciously agreed to join and we are grateful for his participation. A community meeting is scheduled for

November 17 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. The architect, engineer, and schematics will be shared. Everyone is invited to attend and give feedback to the process.

<u>Grace Triangle Park</u>: A community meeting will be held on December 1 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. We plan to have surveys and designs available for public input.

<u>Lowcountry Local</u>: The community business academy held at the Town Hall each Wednesday is going well. Mayor Lyon said she attended a class where a business product was being designed and marketed. She shared that this has been money well spent.

<u>Forum for Town Council Candidates</u>: The League of Women Voters will host a candidate forum on Monday, October 20 at 6:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Mayor Lyon recognized that the four candidates running for office are present tonight. A meet-and-greet will begin at 5:30 p.m. and everyone is invited to attend.

<u>Town Market Update</u>: Mayor Lyon announced that the Town Market held on October 3 was the best ever. There was a huge crowd of around 700 attendees from start to finish. A silent auction was held to support the James Island Outreach to fund their new pantry. \$3,190 was raised. Mayor Lyon complimented Market Manager Parker Richardson for doing a great job as well as Melissa Flick, Mike Hemmer, and Frances Simmons. The next Town Market will be held on Friday, November 7, 6-9 p.m. featuring Dan and the Donuts Band.

Pinckney celebration will take place on Saturday, November 15 at Pinckney Park.

Round-about and Secessionville Stoplight. Charleston County is hosting a community meeting at the Town Hall on November 4 at 6:00 p.m., which is also election day. Please come to the meeting after voting to find out more about those projects.

<u>Finance Report</u>: Finance Director Mike Hemmer reported that the monthly budget report is included in Councilis packet, and the text references the amended budget. The Finance report reflects the changes in the budget, and an addendum was included to respond to specific questions that were asked.

Mr. Hemmer explained that the proposed budget amendment has a slight increase in revenue of \$34,477; and a decrease in expenditures of \$266,400 because there were some capital projects that went to the H-Tax (Hospitality Tax). This is a net improvement of approximately \$300,000.

<u>Island Sheriffis Patrol</u>: Mayor Lyon announced that it was an honor to participate in the program that promoted Lt. Shawn James to Captain. Captain James thanked everyone that showed up to support him. He then reported a quiet month until last night with five vehicle break-ins that occurred. Captain James also shared infractions that took place in the Town. A traffic study will soon be done on Dills Bluff Road.

<u>Public Works Report</u>: Public Works and Licensing Manager, Melissa Flick, presented the September 2025 Public Works Report provided in Councilis packets and it was accepted as information.

#### Requests for Consideration by Staff:

<u>Cecil Circle Culvert Replacement Bid Tabulations</u>: Town Engineer, Laura Cabiness and Melissa Flick provided Council with an update on the Cecil Circle Culvert Replace Project. Four bids were received: LRB Site Prep & Hauling \$43,300; J. Evans Services \$38,460; IPW Construction Group \$34,500; and Landscape Pavers, LLC \$32,765.

The staff recommends award to Landscape Paver, the low bidder, \$32,765. Councilman Boles asked if the decision for the award is from an engineer's standpoint, to which Ms. Cabiness answered. She added she has been working with Landscape Pavers on other projects and has known Arthur Schirmer for a long time. He does a good job with getting a project finished without complaining or asking for a lot of extra money. Ms. Cabiness

added there is a sanitary sewer service line there that needs to be dug out before the work begins and the possibility that a concrete box may need to be put it but that is not definite at this time.

Mayor Lyon called for a motion to accept the staffis recommendation to offer the award for the Cecil Circle Culvert Replacement to Landscape Pavers, \$32,765. Motion was made by Councilwoman Mignano, seconded by Councilman Boles.

## **Committee Reports:**

<u>Land Use Committee</u>: Mayor Lyon reported that the Planning Commission met on September 9 and discussed accessory dwelling units (ADUs) that passed unanimously. Council will entertain a first reading of the ordinance later in the meeting. She thanked Kristen Crane, Council, and staff for their hard work in getting this done. The Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) will meet on October 21 to hear the Townis (applicant) case for the removal of two grand pecan trees on the Hillman lot to move forward with the construction of the Arts and Community Center. She asked those interested to please attend the BZA meeting.

Environment and Beautification Committee: Councilwoman Mignano reported that JI Pride met last night. Helping Hands will host an Adopt-a-Highway litter pickup on January 26. The committee is looking to purchasing hats. The committee will sponsor a table at the Town Market on December 6 for donations to a local foster child fund. Donations of children's articles such as pajamas, socks, etc. are needed as children often come with what they are wearing. Plans are being discussed to reschedule the trash pickup on the connector for October 25

<u>Children's Committee</u>: Councilwoman Mignano reported that the Children's Committee is working on a fall festival on November 14 from 3-7 p.m. at the Town Hall. She gave thanks to Julia Drayton-Crumblin for helping to put on this event. Food Trucks, face painting, and other activities will be had. The next meeting is scheduled for November 22.

Neighborhood Council: Councilman Boles reported that the next meeting will be held on Thursday, October 23 at 6:00 p.m. The guest speaker, Judge Irv Condon, will speak on the probate court. He invited everyone to attend.

• <u>Appointment: Julia Drayton-Crumblin</u>: Motion to appointment Julia Drayton-Crumblin to serve on the Neighborhood Council to represent the Honey Hill community was made by Councilman Boles, seconded by Councilman Mullinax, and passed unanimously.

History Committee: Mayor Lyon reported on updates from the History Committee. Historical markers are being ordered, and a procedure has been developed for them. The Simeon Pinckney celebration will be held on November 15 at Pinckney Park at 1:00 p.m. A replica of Simeon Pinckneyis headstone is being made. The original is in the backyard of a resident, and it was decided it was best to leave it there. The stone is scheduled to arrive in two weeks, and it will be covered until the event is held. Mayor Lyon asked everyone to join with family members, staff, and the community. A reception will follow the installation. The History Council has been displaying information at the Town Market. Next monthis information will be on the archaic Indians that once lived on James Island.

Rethink Folly Road: Mayor Lyon announced that the next meeting will be on November 19 at 3:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

<u>Drainage Committee</u>: Councilman Mullinax announced that he would like to schedule a Drainage Committee meeting before the end of the year.

Business Development Committee: No Report.

<u>Trees Advisory Committee</u>: The Trees Advisory Committee met on Tuesday and will have a tree give-a-way at the November 7 Town Market. An Arbor Day celebration will be held on Friday, December 5 at 11:00 a.m. at Pinckney Park.

<u>James Island Intergovernmental Council</u>: Councilwoman Mignano announced that the next meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 29, 7:00 p.m. the Town Hall.

Tax Committee Accommodation: No Report.

<u>James Island Arts Council</u>: Mayor Lyon announced that a reorganization meeting of the James Island Arts Council will be held on Tuesday, October 21 at 4:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

Resolution #2025-14: Support Plans to Work with Wakeup Carolina to Secure Funding From Opioid Recovery Board: Mayor Lyon presented the resolution for the Town to partner with Wakeup Carolina to secure grant funding from the opioid settlement. She noted that the application deadline is tomorrow. These funds will help persons in the recovery of addition from opioids. Motion to approve was made by Councilman Boles, seconded by Councilman Mullinax. Councilman Dodson asked if the funds were guaranteed to which Mayor Lyon confirmed that it is, and also that the Town will have its own Narcan box stationed at the Town Hall and would support programs through Wakeup Carolina

Ordinance #2025-08: An Ordinance Amending the Business License Ordinance of the Town of James Island to Update the Class Schedule as Required by Act 1776 of 2020: Mayor Lyon stated it is her understanding that this ordinance is required by State law. She said Tami Fralix, Director of Revenue Collections for Charleston County is present tonight and she and Melissa Flick will explain the ordinance.

Melissa Flick said every two years the state requires that municipalities adopt the new business license class schedule. The class schedule change triggers the second part of the ordinance, to adjust the base fee. Ms. Fralix said the standardization act that passed in 1976 was to get everyone in the state on the same page with business licenses because before everyone had a different way of organizing the classes. Now, everyone is required to use the NA Industrial Classification Standard (NAICS) where businesses change within that standard according to its profitability.

The business license ordinance is set up for those businesses in Class 1 (those with the lowest margin of profitability (i.e., grocery and retail stores), and higher classes, i.e., attorneys. Every two years there is a requirement to rebalance. When businesses move into a lower or higher class it changes how much money the Town expects to bring in the next year. One of the biggest changes is Class 4 (personal services, including landscaping, hairdressers, et.), any services that are vague, but considered a personal service This class went from Class 4 to Class 3. In the Townis Ordinance the change is \$5.00 for the base rate for all classes and a .20 rate per thousand. An example was given that a landscaper previously in Class 4 (moved to Class 3). He was paying a base fee of \$45; if he goes up \$5.00 and moves to Class 3, he still pays \$45 so that has not changed. The rate per thousand is still lower than it was in Class 4. So, a landscaper grossing \$100,000 would be paying \$5.00 less under this Ordinance change. She said there are some businesses that went to a higher class; but those moved to a lower class will not see much difference. Businesses such as mining, transportation, and warehouses are in a higher class and there are none in the Town.

Ms. Fralix said if no changes are made, based on the forecast of gross receipts from last year, we could expect to bring in \$40,000 less than we did this year, which represents 13-14% of current business license revenues. Councilman Boles asked since we do not have mining and warehouses in the Town who is paying the \$40,000. Ms. Fralix said that is taken care of on the increase of the base rate and the .20 increase in the rate per thousand.

Councilman Boles said that he does not want to go after the î littleï guys. Melissa Flick added that if we make no changes (if we do not adjust by the \$5.00) that goes away because certain businesses in rate classes would be a step down and pay less per thousand. Mayor Lyon added that some businesses are not paying more because they are moving to a lower category and asked if we would not lose \$40,000 which Ms. Fralix said is distributed across the businesses. Businesses that are Class 3; (which the Town does not have much of) were Class 4. Mayor Lyon asked if Charleston County is raising their rates and Ms. Fralix said they raised it the last time and if the Town raises theirs now, will be where the County is.

There was some discussion regarding other municipalities and whether or they have raised their class rates. Councilman Dodson asked at about the City of Folly Beach and Ms. Fralix replied that Folly Beach is currently higher and are not changing; their highest source is short-term rentals that is in a higher class.

Ms. Fralix answered Councilwoman Mignanois question about the purpose of the ordinance with the goal of having all businesses in their proper rate class when they move from one class into another. Further the Town would be correcting its rate classes, so it is revenue neutral; not raises taxes. She said the Ordinance has to be passed; whether the rates are increased is up to the town. Councilman Dodson explained the changes proposed.

After additional discussion Mayor Lyon called for a vote. Councilman Dodson moved for the approval of the \$5.00 base increase, seconded by Councilman Mullinax. There was discussion among Council and several members felt that additional information was needed. Councilman Dodson withdrew his motion, and Councilman Mullinax withdrew his second. A motion to table decision tonight for the First Reading of the ordinance was made by Councilman Dodson, seconded by Councilman Mullinax.

Ordinance #2025-10: Proposed Amendments to the Town of James Island Zoning and Land Development Regulations (ZLDR): Definitions: 153.0131 Non-conforming Structures: 153.359; Non-conforming Registered Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs): 153.362: Planning Director, Kristen Crane, gave an overview of the proposed amendments: 1) Adding definitions for accessory dwelling units and non-conforming registered accessory dwelling units; 2) Non-conforming structures; adding reference to new section; 3) adding wording to allow for non-conforming registered accessory dwelling units with conditions and requirements.

Ms. Crane said she reviewed the videos from Councilis workshop where they spoke about having a phased approach for ADUs and this would be Phase 1. Any ADU prior to this version of the Town (October 2012) that was converted or built (if someone goes through this process) would be considered a non-conforming registered ADU. This would not account for those who have permits with the County or the Town but would be for those who cannot prove that they were permitted. This would be helpful to become compliant and have a registry. Once Phase II begins existing ADUs from 2012 onwards could be heard before the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA). She will begin to work on Phase II. Mayor Lyon called for a motion to approve the Ordinance for the proposed amendments. Motion was made by Councilman Boles, seconded by Councilwoman Mignano.

Mayor Lyon and all members of Council thanked Ms. Crane for all of the hard work she put into this process, Councilman Mullinax added this is a good step towards affordable housing.

#### Old Business: None.

New Business: Mayor Lyon announced that we will have two additional council members after the election, and we need to be able to accommodate them. She has spoken to the members of Council individually about options and she and the Town Clerk have discussed them. Mayor Lyon has spoken to carpenters and furniture specialists for ideas about what could be done to use what we have. She said one company could make a table that is set in the center for another council member and make a table for the Town Clerk from the same material for \$1,000 each. Mayor Lyon noted Councilwoman Mignano, and others have some concerns with the tables because of the grooves in the wood. It collects dusts and other debris. The vendor could blow it out and sand and epoxy the tables along with two that we purchase for \$6,000 if we go that route and have it ready by January 1when Council takes office. This price would also include a panel at the front of the tables instead of the curtains there. Another option would be to do something similar to Folly Beach and put the tables in storage for the new Arts and Community Center and build something from scratch for \$10-20,000. Mayor Lyon said she is open to other options. There was discussion among Council about the functionality of the current table and its history, also other frugal options. Councilwoman Mignano said she would do research as well and get pricing from a company that she knows. Mayor Lyon indicated she would let Council know how we would proceed after Councilwoman Mignano speak with her contacts.

Executive Session: Mayor Lyon announced that the Town Council may enter into an Executive Session in accordance with Code of Laws of South Carolina 30-4-70(a)(2) to discuss receipt of legal advice for the litigation matter KT Properties, LLC vs. Town of James Island. Upon returning to Open Session the Council may act on matters discussed in the Executive Session.

Mayor Lyon asked for a motion to enter into the Executive Session at 8:59 p.m. Councilwoman Mignano moved, seconded by Councilman Dodson.

# **November 2025 Finance Report**

This monthly financial summary report is for the period ending October 31, 2025 the fourth month of our 2025-2026 Fiscal Year or a third (33.33%) of the way completed.

This report assumes the second reading of the budget amendment proposed at the October Council meeting will meet with approval tonight.

Our auditor was in for field work for a couple of days earlier in November. We responded quickly with most items they needed.

Most budget items and most departments are at or below budget. I've highlighted a few items that stand out, and I am happy to answer any questions you may have.

# Revenues:

Overall, revenues are currently at 33.3% to budget, right on target. I would only point out that we received additional MISCELLANEOUS revenue due to the fundraiser that was held for James Island Outreach at the October Town Market. Those funds came in and went right back out as an expense, but they were not contemplated during the October amendment. We can fix this with a future amendment.

# **Expenses:**

Administration (overall at 25.6% of budget)

• <u>Please note that salaries and benefits are higher due to October being a 3-pay</u> period month. This applies to Elected Officials and Island Safety Patrol also.

Public Works (overall at 49.3% due to reimbursable stormwater projects)

Code Enforcement (at 1.8% of budget)

Planning, Zoning, & Permitting (at 18.4% of budget)

**Emergency Services / CERT (at 6.6% of budget)** 

Facilities, Parks, & Equipment (at 23.3% of budget)

- Facility Rental Deposit Returns are an item that we may be guessing at all year and may need to be amended. This is the return of a security deposit when the rental of our spaces is complete.
- Supplies for FPE is running higher at the moment, primarily due to the resupply of contractor grad lawn bags that we ran out of completely.

# Community Services (at 21.3% of budget)

# Island Sheriff's Patrol (at 35.1% of budget)

• As noted, October was a 3-pay period month. With additional deputy shifts, you can see the department is running just a bit over 33.3%. This is an item we will need to watch to see if it requires an amendment later in the fiscal year.

#### **HTAX Fund**

- In the HTAX Operating Fund, the only item to watch is the expenses for the Town Market. It is a little high at the moment due to purchases for promotional items and t-shirts that will be sold.
- Capital HTAX projects will begin to get into gear soon with the JIACC construction project.

• ATAX revenues are beginning to come in from the State and County.

# **CODE ENFORCEMENT**

The Code Enforcement Department is responsible for ensuring compliance with approved Town Codes, specifically zoning, livability, and business licensing. Other codes, such as building, animal control, and public works are handled in conjunction with Charleston County through an intergovernmental agreement.

The most prevalent issues the Town faces deal with inoperable vehicles and excessive vegetation. Over the last couple of years there has been a rise in construction complaints as zoning permits from the Town are required prior to building permits being issued by the County. These complaints usually take the longest time to address. The Town also receives complaints regarding the cutting of trees and roosters, along with many other issues.

Currently there are several issues that have become serious enough to warrant court action. One is for solid waste and inoperable vehicles on a residential property. Another is for work that has been conducted at a business that has received zoning approval but has not completed the building permit process. There is also a residential property that is in the process of acquiring necessary building permits and has had to work with planning and zoning with the Town to correct work that had been done. There are also two cases that are going through the BZA process in hopes of obtaining a variance. We have one case currently where the property owner has been issued several times but not much has changed. The Town Attorney is looking into other avenues to move the issue forward.

The Town works diligently with citizens to provide an opportunity to correct mistakes before court action is taken. Once communication has been established a timeline is developed to bring the property into compliance. If reasonable progress is not made in accordance with the timeline court action may be required. Usually, issues can be resolved by working with the property owner and sometimes with our partners at Charleston County, the Sheriff's Office, and the PSD. The goal is to gain compliance with the regulations while recognizing the efforts being made by our citizens to correct any issues with their property. There are a few instances where the issue is more of a citizen/county matter but the Town remains involved through the zoning permit process.

# TO INSTALL SPEED HUMPS ON WAITES DRIVE



Barrier Islands Free Medical Clinic (BIFMC) provides high-quality, compassionate primary and specialty health care to uninsured adults who live or work across the Barrier Islands and larger Tricounty community. James Island residents and workers make up a significant percent of our patient population, due to both proximity to our Clinic as well as the large volume of service and hospitality workers who are eligible for our free services. Since 2008, our volunteers and supporters have helped us deliver more than 72,000 free patient visits, bridging critical gaps in access to healthcare and empowering adults to live healthier, more stable lives.

In the fall of 2024, we expanded our eligibility to include Charleston, Dorchester, and Berkeley counties, ensuring that even more adults struggling without insurance can receive the care they deserve. This expansion has led to remarkable growth. Our active patient population has increased by more than 85% this past year alone, reflecting the growing need for free, accessible healthcare in our community.

Our clinic is operated by the volunteer support of over 120 volunteer practitioners, nurses, and administrative staff who give their time and expertise to support our mission. Our patients have access to both primary and specialty care through 19 sub-specialties, including psychiatry, neurology, gynecology, dermatology, and ophthalmology. These services are crucial for the prevention and management of chronic diseases such as diabetes, hypertension, coronary artery disease, and depression, conditions that if left untreated could lead to lost wages, medical debt, and continuing cycles of poverty.

To meet this increasing demand, BIFMC has expanded its Protect and Prevent Program, which strengthens our preventive care, vaccination, and screening services. This program focuses on providing preventative care for our patients including life saving screenings for chronic disease and cancer prevention as well as adult immunizations aligned with CDC guidelines which include Influenza, Herpes Zoster, Pneumococcal, Tetanus, Hepatitis A & B, Diphtheria, and Pertussis. Through this Expanded Healthcare Initiative, we aim to ensure that every patient regardless of income has access to the same level of protection and preventive care as any insured adult in our region.

In 2025, we also launched a new on-site dispensing pharmacy, allowing patients to receive free medications immediately after their appointments. Led by our Pharmacist in Charge, Dr. Mary Kunitzer, this service improves treatment adherence, medication safety, and overall health outcomes, removing another barrier to care for our uninsured patients.

The Dee Norton Child Advocacy Center ("Dee Norton") is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that provides expert, comprehensive services from the moment of concern for abuse through the healing process. With the mission to prevent abuse, protect children, and heal families, Dee Norton has served over 36,000 children and their families primarily from Charleston and Berkeley Counties since opening in 1991.

Dee Norton is requesting \$5,000 in funding from the Town of James Island Community Assistance Grant to support direct services with children referred through our Collaborative Community Response to Child Abuse (CCRCA) Program. The goal of the CCRCA Program is to effectively coordinate and respond to cases of suspected child abuse within our community to reduce the negative impact of abuse on children and the related long-term suffering (individual, familial and societal) associated with childhood exposure to trauma.

When law enforcement or child protective services believe a child is being abused, the child is brought to the Dee Norton Child Advocacy Center—a safe, child-focused environment—by a caregiver or other "safe" adult. At Dee Norton, the child tells their story once to a trained forensic interviewer who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not retraumatize the child and elicits the most factual information possible in order to assist investigatory partners in holding an identified offender accountable and protect the child or to rule out abuse. Investigative partners (i.e., DSS, police) observe the child's forensic interview through a closed-circuit system and help identify immediate response needs and coordinate efforts to protect the child. Then, a team that includes medical professionals, law enforcement, mental health, solicitor's office, child protective services, victim advocacy, and other professionals make decisions together about how to help the child and family based on the interview and other collateral information collected through interviews with caregivers and partner professionals. Dee Norton also offers mental health services (assessment & evidence-based treatment) and medical exams, plus courtroom preparation, victim advocacy, case management, and other services. This is called the multidisciplinary team (MDT) response and is a core part of the work of Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) do across the nation. In 2021, the Child Abuse Response Protocol Act became a state law. This law established a statewide protocol to effectively and efficiently respond to child abuse cases. It also formalized the use of Children's Advocacy Centers and Multidisciplinary Teams in the statewide response to child abuse and helps ensure that all children have access to the trauma informed evidence-based services that Children's Advocacy Centers provide regardless of where they live in South Carolina.

In 2024, Dee Norton provided specialized services and MDT case coordination to 1,165 children and their families. We anticipate serving over 1,200 children and their families in 2025 and 1,300 in 2026. All services provided by Dee Norton are provided at no cost to the child or family, with the average cost per child of \$2,000. In addition to accepting referrals from our investigative partners (i.e., law enforcement, child protective services), Dee Norton also accepts referrals from medical providers, educators/schools and directly from families. Based on the anticipated number of children for 2025 and 2026 and the expected 4 percent of whom will be residents of the Town of James Island, the average annual cost to serve suspected child victims of abuse from the Town is \$100,000.





In the years since the loss of practice and performance space at Fort Johnson Middle School back in 2017, we have adapted to new rehearsal and performance spaces, largely thanks to the support of parents and the James Island community.

However, the transition form a small school club to a non-profit organization has meant that our operating costs have increased. We now have to cover expenses like venue rental, insurance, and administrative costs, on top of the usual production expenses. To ease the financial burden on our participant's parents and keep theater accessible to all, we strive to become more financially independent. The funding from this grant would go toward the rental of performance and rehearsal space at James Island Charter High School, and ensure that student fees and ticket sales can go straight to funding the operations of each show (licensing, sets, makeup, costumes, etc.)

We are dedicated to empowering youth through theater by fostering their talents and leadership. We believe that stage performance builds confidence, encourages personal growth, and promotes collaboration for these young people, all while captivating, entertaining, and bringing joy to the James Island community. We hope that you will consider supporting us in this endeavor, as your backing would mean so much to both us and to our performers and their families.



Founded 47 years ago in 1978, Pet Helpers has remained an essential part of the James Island community, providing shelter and rehabilitation to thousands of animals in need each year through adoption, foster care, a robust humane education program, lost and found pet services, low-cost spay/neuter surgeries, preventative vaccines, medical assistance, TNR services, and community programs like a pet food bank, Levi's Legacy, and Seniors for Seniors. We collaborate with city and county animal control by accepting seized, stray, and injured animals when needed. Additionally, in partnership with the Town of James Island, we continue to host quarterly vaccine clinics to help combat rabies and other preventable diseases within the community.

In 2025, Pet Helpers has already taken in 298 stray animals from James Island, accounting for a significant portion of our overall intake this year. With the current cost of care per animal, basic care for these strays exceeds over \$130,000, not including any specialized or emergency treatments which are incredibly common. In addition, our team has provided 144 vaccinations for community pets at James Island vaccine clinics and facilitated 230 Trap-Neuter-Release procedures, directly reducing community spread of disease and overpopulation. This year also marked the implementation of microchip scanning stations on James Island and Charleston County. This has been a proactive step designed to help reunite lost pets with their owners quickly, preventing unnecessary shelter stays and easing the strain on an already overcrowded system.

Pet Helpers has continued to provide high quality care for James Island's animals when no other options exist. 

Waves 4 Women is a nonprofit therapeutic surf program for women, teens and girls which promotes psychological and physical wellbeing through a combination of surf and mindfulness instruction and community building. We have been serving the James Island community since 2019. Residents and visitors of James Island are frequent volunteers for and participants in our programming. Waves 4 Women depends on community grants and fundraising to make it possible for us to continue the work we do empowering, strengthening and healing women and girls. We sincerely need funding and support this year in order to accomplish our goals and continue effectively serving this community.

Waves 4 Women provides much more than surfing. We provide a science-based blue mind therapy curriculum in a supportive environment for women and girls. We serve women in our surf clinics via individual registrations into a series of small group sessions, or via collaboration with like-minded organizations who partner with us to offer our surf therapy program to the women from their organization. Similarly, we serve middle school and teen girls via individual registration for our teens clinic, or via our partnerships with other community-based organizations with a collaborative purpose or mission that blends with ours. Many of the women and girls we encounter are struggling with stressors and challenges such as depression, anxiety, addiction, abuse, neglect, financial difficulties, relationship struggles, family dysfunction, poverty, grief, burnout, health issues, and the list goes on and on. The beach and the ocean naturally encourage healing and teach resilience, and we use surfing and mental health activities to collaboratively manage challenges.

What we need funding and support for now include the following:

- The financial ability to pay surf instructors. Our instructors (many of whom are James Island residents) are currently volunteers. These women are wonderful, but they all can't give of their time and energy for free all of the time. In order to ensure the safety of our participants, we need properly ocean rescue trained surf instructors. Our lead surf instructors need to be paid positions.
- The financial ability to pay mental health care providers. Again, most of our wellness coaches, therapists, social workers and psychologists are James Island residents and are volunteers. We only have one, very

- part-time paid wellness professional. Paid professionals can provide the care that the women and girls we serve deserve.
- The financial ability to lower the cost of our pay-for clinics for both individuals and groups, AND to start a scholarship/hardship fund. We never want someone to be unable to get the care, support and community she needs because they can't afford it. Having a scholarship fund has long been a goal of Waves 4 Women, but we need financial support to realize this dream.
- 100% of a community grant award from the Town of James Island would go into supporting our programming.

We are committed to empowering women and girls in and around the James Island community. Let's serve the women and girls of James Island together.

#### **Executive Summary**

WakeUp Carolina is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit recovery community organization serving **Charleston**, **Berkeley**, and **Dorchester Counties** through two offices located in Charleston and Berkeley County, South Carolina.

The organization was born from unimaginable loss — the passing of 19-year-old Creighton Shipman — and a promise that his story would not end there. Surrounded by community and lifted by love that extended beyond zip codes, the Shipman family transformed grief into purpose. What began as one family's commitment to ensure that no other family walked this road alone has grown into a movement of hope, resilience, and recovery that now serves thousands across the Lowcountry.

WakeUp Carolina's mission is to promote awareness, provide education, and offer hope in recovery for young adults, individuals, veterans, and families impacted by substance use through collaborative community partnerships, trusted resources, and support services across Berkeley, Charleston, and Dorchester Counties.

Since 2016, WakeUp Carolina has become a trusted regional leader in prevention, harm reduction, recovery, and family support — all provided at no cost to the community. Through South Carolina Opioid Recovery Fund (SCORF) allocations, WakeUp Carolina currently partners with Berkeley County and the Town of Mount Pleasant to deliver SCORF-approved abatement strategies and uses. These partnerships have established the state's first veteran and veteran-family recovery and wellness program, the first family navigation and case management program in Berkeley County, and one of South Carolina's earliest community overdose prevention and naloxone access initiatives — each now serving as a model for municipalities statewide.

Since 2020, WakeUp Carolina has touched the lives of more than three million community members through outreach, prevention, education, recovery services, and family support — a reflection of the power of partnership, compassion, and shared purpose.

The **Spero Collective** represents the next step in this work: a collaborative partnership between the **Town** of James Island and WakeUp Carolina that expands these proven models locally. This initiative aligns with SCORF-approved abatement strategies and focuses on three integrated projects:

- Expanding 24/7 naloxone access and overdose prevention education;
- Launching South Carolina's first **surf recovery program**, serving individuals, families, first responders, and veterans through trauma-informed surf therapy;
- Supporting a Community Partnership Coordinator to strengthen communication, collaboration, and program alignment between municipal leadership, recovery advocates, and service providers.

Through *The Spero Collective*, the Town of James Island and WakeUp Carolina will continue **bridging** gaps and removing barriers between community, treatment, law enforcement, and recovery—ensuring that every resident has access to the care, education, and hope they deserve.

#### Introduction

WakeUp Carolina respectfully presents this proposal to the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of James Island in support of *The Spero Collective* — a collaborative community initiative designed to strengthen local overdose prevention, recovery support, and family wellness. Grounded in shared purpose and partnership, this project embodies the spirit of "Dum Spiro Spero – While I Breathe, I Hope."

Together, the Town of James Island and WakeUp Carolina will build a model of compassion and accountability — connecting municipal leadership, law enforcement, and recovery advocates in service of community safety and healing. The Spero Collective represents a collaborative effort between the Town of James Island and WakeUp Carolina to strengthen local overdose prevention, recovery, and community resilience initiatives. Grounded in the Latin phrase "Dum Spiro Spero – While I Breathe, I Hope," the Collective embodies shared purpose, compassion, and accountability. Through joint programming, open communication, and aligned community outreach, the Spero Collective bridges municipal leadership and recovery support — ensuring that hope, help, and healing remain within reach for every neighbor on James Island.

This project will establish a 24/7 Barney Naloxone Stand™ — a free, weather-resistant, and mobile naloxone access station located at Town Hall — providing life-saving nasal naloxone to the community for one year. The initiative will also include monthly Overdose Prevention & Narcan Training sessions at Town Hall, conducted in partnership with the Town of James Island, WakeUp Carolina, the Charleston County Sheriff's Office (led by Lt. Steve Kudron, Head of County Wellness), and Charleston Center's Prevention Coordinator, Sarah Halsey.

Each training will include distribution of Link2Resource (L2S) Kits, which contain nasal naloxone, safety tools, and educational materials connecting participants to local treatment, recovery, and family support resources.

The goal of this partnership is to bridge gaps and remove barriers between community, treatment, law enforcement, and recovery, ensuring that help and hope are accessible to all. Through shared

effort, education, and care, this project strengthens James Island's ability to respond to overdoses, prevent loss of life, and build a healthier, more connected community.



The Tide Turners Recovery Project will serve individuals and families impacted by substance use and trauma, including young adults, law enforcement, veterans, and those grieving the loss of a loved one. The goal of this partnership is to create accessible, trauma-informed recovery opportunities that reconnect people to self, community, and nature through surf therapy.

Rooted in the expertise of the nation's leading surf therapy organizations, Tide Turners draws on the training and methodology of Groundswell Surf Therapy<sup>TM</sup>, which since 2018 has trained over 700 clinicians, students, surf coaches, and community leaders in trauma recovery and mental health through ocean-based wellness practices. The program also integrates lessons from international surf therapy pioneers such as the International Surf Therapy Organization (ISTO) and Surfwell, a pilot initiative launched by Devon & Cornwall Police in the United Kingdom that provides surf therapy to officers and first responders experiencing mental health challenges.

#### AN ORDINANCE

# AMENDING THE BUSINESS LICENSE ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF JAMES ISLAND TO UPDATE THE CLASS SCHEDULE AS REQUIRED BY ACT 176 OF 2020.

WHEREAS, the TOWN of JAMES ISLAND (the "Municipality") is authorized by S.C. Code Section 5-7-30 and Title 6, Chapter 1, Article 3 to impose a business license tax on gross income;

WHEREAS, by Act No. 176 of 2020, known as the South Carolina Business License Tax Standardization Act and codified at S.C. Code Sections 6-1-400 to -420 (the "Standardization Act"), the South Carolina General Assembly imposed additional requirements and conditions on the administration of business license taxes;

WHEREAS, the Standardization Act requires that by December thirty-first of every odd year, each municipality levying a business license tax must adopt, by ordinance, the latest Standardized Business License Class Schedule as recommended by the Municipal Association of South Carolina (the "Association") and adopted by the Director of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office;

WHEREAS, following the enactment of the Standardization Act, the Municipality enacted Ordinance No. 2021-09 on November 18, 2021, in order to comply with the requirements of the Standardization Act (the "Current Business License Ordinance");

WHEREAS, the TOWN Council of the Municipality (the "Council") now wishes to amend the Current Business License Ordinance to adopt the latest Standardized Business License Class Schedule, as required by the Standardization Act;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Mayor and Council of the TOWN of JAMES ISLAND, as follows:

**SECTION 1. Amendments to Appendix A.** Appendix A to the Current Business License Ordinance, the "Business License Rate Schedule," is hereby amended as follows:

(a) Classes 1-7 is hereby amended and restated in its entirety to read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TOWN OF JAMES ISLAND ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS ORDINANCE, NUMBER 2013-07: (EXHIBIT A): DEFINITIONS: SECTION 153.013; NONCONFORMING STRUCTURES: SECTION 153.359 (A); AND NONCONFORMING REGISTERED ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS (ADUS): SECTION 153.362.

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Local Government Comprehensive Planning Enabling Act of 1994, Sections 6-29-310, et seq., 6-29-510 et seq., 6-29-710 et seq. and 6-29-110 et seq., of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, authorizes the Town of James Island to enact or amend its zoning and land development regulations to guide development in accordance with existing and future needs and in order to protect, promote and improve the public health, safety, and general welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Town of James Island Planning Commission has reviewed the proposed text amendments of the Town of James Island Zoning and Land Development Regulations Ordinance (ZLDR) in accordance with the procedures established in State law and the ZLDR, and has recommended that the Town of James Island Council adopt the proposed text amendments of the ZLDR as set forth in Section 153.013, 153.359, and 153.362 herein; and

WHEREAS, upon receipt of the recommendation of the Planning Commission, Town Council held at least one (1) public hearing and after the close of the public hearing, Town Council approves the proposed text amendments based on the Approval Criteria of Section 153.042 (F) of the ZLDR;

WHEREAS, the Town Council has determined the proposed text amendments meet the following criteria:

- The proposed amendments correct an error or inconsistency or meets the challenge of a changing condition; and
- (B). The proposed amendments are consistent with the adopted Town of James Island Comprehensive Plan and goals as stated in Section 153.005; and
- (C). The proposed amendments are to further the public welfare in any other regard specified by Town Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, be ordained it, by the Town of James Island Council in meeting duly assembled, as follows:

#### SECTION I. FINDINGS INCORPORATED

The above recitals and findings are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Ordinance.

# SECTION II. TEXT AMENDMENT OF THE ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS ORDINANCE

The Town of James Island Zoning and Land Development Regulations Ordinance is hereby amended to include the text amendments of Section 153.013, 153.359, and 153.362 and is attached hereto as "Exhibit A" and made a part of this Ordinance by reference.

#### SECTION III. SEVERABILITY

If, for any reason, any part of this Ordinance is invalidated by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### SECTION IV. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately following second reading by the Town Council.

#### § 153.013 DEFINITIONS.

ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT (ADU). A Dwelling Unit providing complete, independent living facilities for one or more persons that is separate from and subordinate to the principal Dwelling Unit, while both Units are serviced by one electrical meter. This definition includes Garage Apartments.

NONCONFORMING REGISTERED ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT (ADU). An ADU that existed on or before October 18, 2012, but which no longer complies with the density, intensity, and dimensional standards of the underlying zoning district, yet has met the applicable requirements in Section 153.362 to be considered a registered and allowed (legal) ADU.

#### § 153.356 EXISTING NONCONFORMITIES.

- (A) Authority to continue. Any nonconformity that legally existed on October 18, 2012 or that becomes nonconforming upon the adoption of any amendment of this chapter may be continued in accordance with the provisions of this subchapter.
- (B) Determination of nonconformity status. The burden of establishing that a nonconformity is a legal nonconformity shall, in all cases, rest solely upon the owner of such nonconformity.
- (C) Repairs and maintenance. Incidental repairs and normal maintenance of nonconformities shall be permitted unless such repairs are otherwise expressly prohibited by this chapter. Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to prevent structures from being structurally strengthened or restored to a safe condition, in accordance with an official order of the Director of Building Inspection or his or her designee.
- (D) Change of tenancy or ownership. The status of nonconformity is not affected by changes of tenancy, ownership, or management.

(Ord. 2012-06, §§ 10.1.2 through 10.1.5, passed 10-18-2012; Ord. 2013-09, passed 8-15-2013)

#### § 153.359 NONCONFORMING STRUCTURES.

- (A) *Definition*. A **NONCONFORMING STRUCTURE** is any building or structure that was legally established but which no longer complies with the density, intensity, and dimensional standards of the underlying zoning district. For **NONCONFORMING REGISTERED ADU** Regulations, See Section 153.362.
- (B) *Use.* A nonconforming structure may be used for any use allowed in the underlying zoning district.

- (C) Expansion. A nonconforming residential structure may be enlarged or expanded if such residential expansion follows the outside wall at ground level, other than porches, decks, or canopies. The outside wall (other than porches, decks, or canopies) of a nonconforming residential structure that does not meet current dimensional standards (setbacks), shall only be allowed to expand vertically from ground level provided that such expansion does not exceed the maximum building height requirements for that zoning district or encroach into any setback. All other expansion shall meet all other applicable portions of the chapter including density, intensity, and dimensional standards.
- (D) *Moving.* A nonconforming structure may be moved in whole or in part to another location if the movement or relocation does not increase the extent of nonconformity.
- (E) Subdivision. If a lot is occupied by a nonconforming structure, it may be subdivided provided that subdividing does not create a new nonconformity or increase the degree of nonconformance of the structure.
  - (F) Loss of legal nonconforming status; damage or destruction.
- (1) No nonconforming commercial or industrial structure that is damaged by fire or any other cause shall be restored if the cost of the repair work equals 50% or more of the structure's total physical replacement cost. Determination of physical replacement costs shall be made by the Director of Building Inspection. When such repairs are allowed to be made, they shall be in full compliance with the regulations of this chapter.
- (2) A nonconforming residential structure that is damaged by fire or any other cause may be restored. In such cases, the structure may be re-established to the extent that existed before the time of damage, within the pre-existing structure boundaries (footprint and height), provided that the repairs or rebuilding do not increase the degree of nonconformity and provided that such repairs, restoration, and reconstruction begin within 12 months of the date of such damage.
- (3) Nothing in this section shall conflict with the requirements of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Flood Plain Management Regulations.

# § 153.362 NONCONFORMING REGISTERED ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS (ADUs).

**DWELLING (DWELLING UNIT).** A building or portion of it designed and used for residential occupancy by a single household and that includes exclusive sleeping, cooking, eating, and sanitation facilities.

ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT (ADU). A Dwelling Unit providing complete, independent living facilities for one or more persons that is separate from and subordinate to the principal Dwelling Unit, while both Units are serviced by one electrical meter. This definition includes Garage Apartments.

- (A) <u>Definition</u>. A <u>NONCONFORMING REGISTERED ADU</u> is an ADU that existed on or before October 18, 2012, but which no longer complies with the density, intensity, and dimensional standards of the underlying zoning district, yet has met the following requirements to be considered a registered and allowed (legal) ADU.
- (B) <u>Determination</u>. The burden of establishing that a nonconforming ADU existed before October 18, 2012, and that all requirements contained in this section are satisfied, in all cases, rests solely upon the owner of such nonconformity. Acceptable documentation for proving that a nonconforming ADU existed on or before October 18, 2012 may consist of sworn affidavits from adjacent property owners and others who have personal knowledge, and/or other evidence deemed necessary and/or sufficient by the Zoning Administrator.
- (C) Requirements:
- Must apply for Nonconforming Registered ADU approval through the application, and receive approval from the Zoning Administrator in order to continue occupancy.
- 2. Only one Nonconforming Registered ADU shall be permitted per lot.
- 3. Full-time property owner must reside on property. Proof of full-time residency must be provided at the time of application with owner-occupied legal residence tax bill, driver's license, voter registration, vehicle registration, and any other documentation requested by the Zoning Administrator and listed on the application.
- Separate electrical meters shall not be allowed for Nonconforming Registered ADUs.
- Nothing in this section shall conflict with the requirements of the Federal
   Emergency Management Agency's Flood Plain Management Regulations or the current adopted flood ordinance.
- 6. There shall be no adding to the existing footprint (expansion) of the Nonconforming Registered ADU.
- 7. If structure does not have a Certificate of Occupancy for habitation, retroactive building permits from Charleston County Building Services and applicable zoning permits must be obtained. This may include updating the structure to comply with current building code, inspections, flood regulations,

- and any other applicable federal and state regulations including all requirements of the applicable code of ordinances.
- 8. Applicant must notify all appropriate government, utility and emergency service providers (including but not limited to JIPSD, CWS, 911, and Charleston County Addressing), and provide letters of coordination from each entity, per application.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE FISCAL YEAR 2025-2026 BUDGET FOR THE TOWN OF JAMES ISLAND, SOUTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, the Town of James Island requires a budget to guide and direct the receipt of expenditure of revenues during Fiscal Year 2025-2026; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-7-260 South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended, requires that certain acts by Municipal Councils be done by ordinance, including the adoption of a budget; and

WHEREAS, South Carolina law requires that a duly noticed public hearing be held prior to the adoption of a municipal budget; and

WHEREAS, this duly noticed public hearing occurred on May 15, 2025;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED AND ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF JAMES ISLAND, SOUTH CAROLINA:

Section 1: Purpose

This Ordinance is adopted to provide the Town of James Island with an Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2025-2026.

Section 2: Creation of the Fiscal Year 2025-2026 Budget for the Town of James Island, South Carolina By passage of this Ordinance, the Town of James Island adopts as its Budget for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 "Exhibit A," incorporated fully herein by reference, and maintains the property tax operating millage rate at 0.0179 (17.9 mills), and applies the Local Option Sales Tax Property Tax Credit to cover the full amount of the Town's 17.9 millage rate. EXHIBIT A

Section 3: Severability

If any part of this Ordinance is held to be unconstitutional, it shall be construed to have been the legislative intent to pass said Ordinance without such unconstitutional provision, and the remainder of said Ordinance shall be deemed valid as if such part had not been included. If said Ordinance or any provision thereof, is held to be inapplicable to any person, group of persons, property, and kind of property, circumstances or set of circumstances, such holding shall not affect the applicability thereof to any other persons, property, or circumstances.
